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FOREWORD

Georgia is a highly disaster-prone country, which frequently experiences natural hazards (e.g. earthquakes, floods, landslides, mudflows, avalanches, and drought) as well as man-made emergencies (e.g. industrial accidents and traffic accidents). Compounding factors such as demographic change, unplanned urbanization, poorly maintained infrastructure, lax enforcement of safety standards, socio-economic inequities, epidemics, environmental degradation and climate variability amplify the frequency and intensity of disasters and call for a proactive and multi-hazard approach.

Disaster risk reduction is a cross-cutting and complex development issue. It requires political and legal commitment, public understanding, scientific knowledge, careful development planning, responsible enforcement of policies and legislation, people-centred early warning systems, and effective disaster preparedness and response mechanisms. Close collaboration of policy-makers, scientists, urban planners, engineers, architects, development workers and civil society representatives is a precondition for adopting a comprehensive approach and inventing adequate solutions. Multi-stakeholder and inter-agency platforms can help provide and mobilize knowledge, skills and resources required for mainstreaming disaster risk reduction into development policies, for coordination of planning and programmes, and for provision of analysis and advice. For this reason, UNDP established a Disaster Risk Reduction Think-Tank in Georgia in March of 2009 in close collaboration with the Georgian Committee for Disaster Risk Reduction and Environmental Sustainable Development (formed in 2008).

Since disaster risk reduction requires new collaboration patterns among a wide group of participants, one of the first joint initiatives was to obtain an overview of who does what and where in the field of disaster risk reduction in Georgia. This 3W-exercise was launched at the first Disaster Risk Reduction Think-Tank meeting in March of 2009. Based upon templates from the inter-agency Emergency Health and Nutrition Working Group in Nepal, forms were developed, translated and disseminated to various agencies / institutions involved in disaster risk reduction. Initial results were presented at the third Think-Tank meeting in July 2009 along with guidelines on how to fill in the questionnaire. The second edition was elaborated during the first three months of 2010. Although this third edition remains a working document, we hope the 50 institutional / organizational profiles will facilitate better coordination among stakeholders in Georgia involved in disaster risk reduction.

This publication is based on information received from partner agencies / organizations and requires continuous review and updating in order to provide an accurate picture of the disaster risk reduction scenario in Georgia. It is important that partners provide regular updates to their profiles in order to keep the publication current. Risk assessment and risk mapping	Methodology to determine and map the nature and extent of risk by analysing potential hazards and evaluating existing conditions of vulnerability

III. DISASTER RISK REDUCTION PROFILE

I. USAID's Office of Foreign Disaster Assistance stands ready to respond to natural disasters and provides assistance when lives or livelihoods are threatened by catastrophes such as civil conflict, acts of terrorism, or industrial accidents. Following the 2008 conflict in Georgia, OFDA deployed a team to provide field assessments in effected regions and facilitate humanitarian coordination and information sharing. While these activities are no longer active in Georgia, however USAID can call on the Office of Foreign Disaster Assistance to provide assistance if there was a disaster in the future. This assistance would be coordinated with the U.S. Embassy's Refugee Coordinator and UNHCR.

II. USAID and the U.S. Office of Defence Cooperation carried out a rapid assessment of the Georgian Red Cross Society (GRCS) to build and support their organizational capacity. As a result of needs identified USAID a) supports a series of coordination meetings with local and international NGOs to map the available resources that could be used in the event of an emergency; b) trains GRCS staff in fundraising; and c) strengthens GRCS' financial management capacity and improves its financial systems to meet the international standards of accounting.

III. USAID supports local NGOs engaged in disaster risk reduction. In September 2009, Caucasus Environmental NGO Network (CENN) began implementing: Strengthening Local Capacity and Developing Structured Dialogue for Climate Change Adaptation, Natural Disaster Risk Reduction and Post-Conflict Environmental Rehabilitation project.

Assessment findings indicate that farming community resilience to the lack of irrigation water can be enhanced through proper technical solutions. FAO also carries out country wide surveillance and diagnostics to control the risk of Transboundary animal diseases to prepare for and possibly prevent outbreaks. Physical-chemical research of the environment		One of the most important problems that the Institute of Geology is researching is the seismo-tectonics of Georgia and creation of geostructural foundation for assessing the seismic hazard. Because of the earth's crust and block structure of lithosphere, earthquake focuses are related to the block borders. In order to identify and specify them, a geology-structural foundation of mapping of seismic zoning was created. After the implemented seismic zoning, a set of ZSD-99 maps was produced for the territory of Georgia. They show the levels of calculated seismic effects (intensity, PGA), for the given P probability of excess and the fixed T time interval, i.e. during this time interval it is possible to occur at least one earthquake, the effect of which will exceed the calculated one. According to the produced results, conditions for using each ZSD-00 map were regulated. Namely, they are intended for anti-seismic measures for constructing the sites with three terms: a. Map 5% probability: for ancillary buildings for non-residential purposes. b. Map 2% probability: for main constructions. c. Map 1% probability: for selecting the sites for constructing significant buildings, for conducting future detailed and micro seismic zoning there. Obviously, the maps mentioned above represent a long-term earthquake forecasting maps, but it is necessary to have them not only for ensuring seismic-stable construction, but also for micro-seismic zoning of large cities and for conducting further detailed researches with the purpose of identifying the earthquake prerequisites.
