Presentation of the Arabic version of the compendium on Building Integrity NATO HQ (Brosio Conference Room), October 3rd, 2012

Welcome address by Ambassador Bénédict de Cerjat

Excellencies, dear Panelists, Ladies & Gentlemen

It is a great pleasure for me to welcome all of you here today on the occasion of the official presentation of the **Arabic version** of the Compendium on Building Integrity.

For Switzerland, the **Building Integrity initiative** is a key element in its work and cooperation with NATO and its partners. My country supports this initiative since its beginning in April 2008.
